PROPOSAL

Capital City PCS submits to the DC Public Charter School Board this application to amend its charter agreement by changing the item(s) selected above. If approved, this amendment will be effective on <u>July 1</u>, 2019 (*leave blank if this has not been determined*).

There are two situations which necessitate we request a de minimis enrollment increase in our charter. First, we have successfully retained an increasing number of our students through their senior year of high school, so will have our largest graduating class next year! As our retention rates increase, ideally, our overall high school enrollment will as well. Second, the number of students across our LEA who will likely need to be categorized as non-public placement (NPP) could increase next year, from the five students we started this year with to as many as eight students next year (based on the increase during this school year, before we know anything about our newly enrolled students).

This year, we had 992 students in the building and five NPP students as of count day. Our charter enrollment cap is 1,000 students, so this total of 997 students has us very close to that cap. If we receive additional students who are designated NPP, and continue to successfully retain our rising high school seniors, we run the risk of exceeding our enrollment count if we fill all the seats in our building that we opened for the My School DC lottery.

We are requesting an enrollment ceiling increase of 20 students (2%), to 1,020. This will allow us to budget and enroll correctly for the number of students we would like to offer seats to in the building, in addition to any NPP students who enroll, without needing to have any further requests for increased enrollment caps in the future.

2. How will the proposed amendment(s) support or enhance the school's mission?

This increase in our enrollment ceiling will allow Capital City to continue to serve the original target of 1,000 students with in-seat enrollment, regardless of an increase in the number of students requiring non-public placement outside of the school building. It will also allow Capital City to maintain our enrollment targets for new 9th and 10th grade students even while we are able to successfully graduate a higher percentage of those students each year.

In the past three years, Capital City has only received a small number of community complaints. We responded promptly to each concern, working with complainants and other parties to reach adequate resolutions.

We do not anticipate significant additional expenses from this change, other than any special education or other student service needs tied specifically to individual students enrolled at Capital City. The main impact is that the de minimis increase in enrollment will allow Capital City to maintain (not increase) our in-seat enrollment levels at all other grade levels, even as our number of graduating high school seniors increases, regardless of whether our NPP population also increases.

Capital City has emailed our ANC Commissioner and our school community to notify them of the application for this de minimis increase in our enrollment limit and to explain the reasons for this application. No concerns have yet been brought to our attention.
