## 2016-17 Secondary Credential and GED Subject Measures

	Earned Secondary Credential	GED Subject Test
Description	Percentage of eligible students who earned a GED, and the percentage of students who earned an NEDP	Percentage of eligible students who pass individual GED subject tests as they work toward achieving the GED
2016-17 Target	100	100
2016-17 Floor	0	40

- DC PCSB will maintain targets at 100
- Adjust Floor(s)
  - 2016-17 the last year the Secondary Credential measure's floor is zero

## March 2016 Task Force

Meeting

Proposed Floor and Target for the Obtained Secondary Credential Measure

- DC PCSB proposes to update the floor and target for this measure once we have three years of data in 2017-18
  - In the meantime, we will hold the floor and target at 0 and 100, respectively
- When updating the floor and target in 2017-18, DC PCSB proposes using a three-year average of the 90<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> percentiles of AE school performance as the Tier 1 and Tier 3 cutoffs\*

<sup>\*</sup>Tier cutoffs are described in detail on slide 36



### Proposal A: Business Rules for Secondary Credential and GED Subject Test Floors

#### Proposal for **Secondary Credential Measure**:

Calculate the floor based on the previous three years' <u>GED attainment rates</u>, where the Tier 3 cutoff is set at the 10<sup>th</sup> percentile of school performance, using a three-year weighted average.

#### Proposal for **GED Subject Test Measure**:

Calculate the floor based on the previous three years' <u>GED subject test data</u>, where the Tier 3 cutoff is set at the 10<sup>th</sup> percentile of school performance, using a three-year weighted average.



### Proposal A: Calculating the 2017-18 Floors

- For 2017-18, use two-year weighted average (2015-16 and 2016-17) of the 10<sup>th</sup> percentile of school performance as the Tier 3 cutoff
- Rationale for limiting data
  - 2013-14 GED changed mid-year
  - 2014-15 N-size too small
- For now, use 2015-16 data to model business rules

#### Proposal A: 2017-18 Estimated <u>GED</u> <u>Subject Test Floor</u>

Target	100
Tier 3 Cutoff (10 <sup>th</sup> Percentile)	72.7

### Proposal B: Business Rules for Secondary Credential and GED Subject Test Floors

#### Proposal for **Secondary Credential Measure**:

Calculate the floor based on the previous three years' <u>GED attainment rates</u>, where the Tier 1 cutoff is set at the charter sector pass rate, using a three-year weighted average.

#### Proposal for **GED Subject Test Measure**:

Calculate the floor based on the previous three years' <u>GED subject test data</u>, where the Tier 1 cutoff is set at the charter sector pass rate, using a three-year weighted average.



#### Proposal B: Modeling the 2017-18 Floors

- Set the Tier 1 cutoff at
  - For now, use two-year weighted average pass rate
  - In November, use three-year weighted average pass rate

## Proposal B: 2017-18 Estimated Secondary Credential Floor

Target	100
Tier 1 Cutoff (Two-Year Weighted Average)	83.1
Floor	51.7

Tier 1 Cutoff and Floor to be updated in Fall 2017



#### Proposal A and B Summary

- Proposal A
  - Tier 3 Cutoff = 10<sup>th</sup> percentile of school performance
- Proposal B
  - Tier 1 Cutoff = charter sector average



#### Implementation Options

#### Option 1

 Immediate transition to <u>one</u> of the new business rules on the 2017-18 PMF's Secondary Credential and GED Subject Test measures

#### Option 2

- Apply the 2016-17 GED Subject Test floor business rule to the 2017-18 Secondary Credential measure
- Implement the new business rule for <u>both</u> measures on the 2018-19 PMF

#### Earned High-Level Certification Measure

Proposal: display-only for another year

- No data to determine floor or target
- Use data from 2016-17 and 2017-18 to set 2018-19 PMF floor and target
- Discuss data collection and validation with schools



#### ATTENDANCE MEASURE



#### Attendance Measure

Consider using OSSE's validated attendance rates instead of DC PCSB's

- Reduce data validation burden
- Minimal difference between OSSE's rates and DC PCSB's

## IMPACT OF WORKFORCE INNOVATION AND OPPORTUNITY ACT (WIOA) ON PMF



#### **WIOA Overview**

- The Act was "designed to help job seekers access employment, education, training, and support services to succeed in the labor market and to match employers with...skilled workers..."
- The Act sets "performance accountability indicators and...reporting requirements to assess the effectiveness of state and local areas in achieving positive outcomes for individuals..."

#### WIOA Overview (cont.)

- Signed into law July 2014
  - Effective July 2015
  - Further provisions effective July 2016
- Additional implementation requirements forthcoming



#### WIOA's Impact on PMF

- Out of the labor force phased out July 2016
- Beginning with 2017-18 PMF, all students will count toward the College and Career Readiness indicator
- Will discuss in-depth once additional implementation guidelines released
